1 The network in action

Real lives, real change across West Yorkshire



Virtual Decisions VR programme

126 immersive VR workshops reached **over 1,100 children** across Bradford, Calderdale, Kirklees and Leeds in ten months, with five films exploring knives, gangs, identity, influence and anti-social behaviour.



Youth voice through music

Two youth-led knife-crime awareness songs, written and performed by young people in Bradford, with radio and press coverage.



Food & cost-of-living support

A weekly community food project supporting **70-110 people**, and holiday clubs serving **~1,500 meals** in a single week.



Community voice, into policy

Residents' safety priorities, captured at events, fed directly into the **West Yorkshire Violence Reduction Strategy**.

2 Building leadership capacity

The network doesn't just connect leaders, it grows them



1-to-1 coaching for community leaders

16 leaders coached over the year, rated 9-10 / 10 and described as 'invaluable', a rare reflective space for people working on the frontline.



Confidence that changes what's possible

One member went from **dreading public speaking to presenting to 67 people** at a university; another worked through imposter syndrome in just three sessions.



From front line delivery to strategic impact

Leaders moved beyond day-to-day delivery to long-term sustainability. Starting with a clear Theory of Change and training and signposting to funding pots has led to targeted community safety projects, with some even launching new community hubs.



Fostering collective leadership

Beyond formal projects, members share advice and guidance day to day, building trust and helping the VRP and the network see which areas are well served and which aren't. This shapes how and where the network responds to local need, creating an impetus to act, knowing no one is leading alone.



The ripple effect

More confident leaders create more inclusive, trusting spaces. At network meetings and in coaching, CLWY members discuss how they support friends and neighbours through the aftermath of knife-crime and domestic violence incidents.

Members winning funding to deliver in their communities

CLWY members have secured **over £121,000** in grants and contracts to deliver violence-prevention, arts and community safety projects across West Yorkshire.

Cut Music: young people, police and professional artists writing and recording music to tackle violence against women and girls. Awarded the Mayor's People's Fund in both 2025 and 2026.
